



World War II Homework Tasks

Leaders of World War II: research one world leader (e.g., Winston Churchill, Franklin D. Roosevelt) and write a fact file.	Home Front: Find out what rationing was and make a weekly ration meal plan.	Propaganda Poster: Design a persuasive WWII-style poster (e.g., "Dig for Victory" or "Make Do and Mend").	Debate Prep: Prepare arguments for or against evacuation: <i>Was it kinder to send children away, or keep them at home?</i>
Maths Link: Work out ration quantities and calculate how much food a family of 4 would get per week. Show your findings in an illustration.	Geography Link: Map out the countries involved in WWII and show which side they were on (Allies, Axis or neutral).	Family Interview: Talk to an older family member (or family friend) about what they know or were told about WWII.	Mini Museum: Collect or make replicas of WWII artefacts (ration books, ID cards, gas mask boxes) and write labels for them.
Book Review: Read a WWII-themed children's book (e.g., <i>Carrie's War</i> , <i>When Hitler Stole Pink Rabbit</i> , <i>The Silver Sword</i>) and write a review.	Home Front: draw or make a model of an Anderson Shelter.	Home Front: research recipes from World War II. Choose one dish to re-create.	The Blitz: write a poem that describes the horror of living through the Blitz.
